

Here are 10 more great things to consider including in your childcare contract:

1 ENROLLMENT DEPOSIT

One of the best ways to ensure you get adequate notice of withdrawal from your program is to require an enrollment deposit that covers the notice period.

2 PAYMENT PROCEDURE

Having a specific payment procedure that details when, how and where tuition payments are to be submitted is a best procedure. It eliminates the weekly inquires.

3 TUITION IN ADVANCE

Requiring tuition payments in advance of the coming week is very practical since most people are paid on Friday.

4 IMMUNIZATIONS

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Are you required to document immunizations? Can you accept children that are not immunized or if parents are opting out of immunizations? Under what conditions?

ADMINISTERING MEDS

Will you administer medication? Under what circumstances? Will you require written instruction and signatures?

f TIME LIMITS

Having a specific time limit for daily care can be helpful. Requiring that contracted hours be adhered to or placing a 9-Hour limit on care is a good policy to have in place.

7 RELEASE OF A CHILD

What mandates do you need to follow in order to release a child at the end of the day? What about releasing a child to someone other than their parents, what is required? What if someone is impaired?

REFUNDS

Under what circumstances are refunds given? How will they be given? Is there a waiting period?

DISCOUNTS

Do you offer any discounts like for siblings? Are there discounts given for half-days or vacations?

10 SIGNATURES

Requiring signatures of the parents as well as your own ensure that the contract is legal and binding.
